

STAKEHOLDER & COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

KEPCO Bylong Australia (KEPCO) is committed to actively seeking community feedback on the Bylong Coal Project (the Project), and implementing engagement mechanisms which ensure that stakeholders and the community feel heard and respected

Throughout the exploration and approvals phase of the Project, local community stakeholders, particularly affected landholders and near neighbours, have been engaged on a regular basis. Specifically, consultation with the local community has included:

- Face-to-face briefings and meetings with Bylong Valley residents, state and local government, key services providers and community groups.
- Community information sessions and stalls held December 2013, February 2014, November 2014, September / October 2015, February / March and April 2016, August 2016 and February / March 2017.
- The appointment of dedicated Community Liaison Officers in the Bylong area, who are available to local residents and community groups.

The wider community has also been engaged through various channels including:

- The establishment of a Project-specific website (www.bylongproject.com.au).
- Distribution of newsletters and ongoing information briefs.
- The production of project fact sheets addressing specific community interests or issues (for example, exploration process, water resources, approvals process).
- The availability of a project site office in Bylong, a 1800 phone number (1800 BYLONG or 1800 295 664) and project email address (bylong@worleyparsons.com).

As part of the preparation of the Project's Environmental Impact Statement (EIS), consultation has been carried out with landholders, near neighbours, local communities, local service providers, Aboriginal stakeholders, government regulators and relevant industry groups. Specifically, a series of project briefings and presentations have been provided to inform stakeholders of the Project and assist in the identification of key issues.

SOCIAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT

A focused consultation program was also undertaken for the Social Impact Assessment. Landholders, local service providers and the community were engaged to help develop the socio-economic profile for the study area, and identify local community values and social issues that may result from each stage of the Project's lifecycle.

Engagement of local Aboriginal stakeholders was completed in accordance with the *Aboriginal Cultural Heritage Consultation Requirements for Proponents 2010*, with 27 Aboriginal organisations registering an interest and participating in the assessment process.

The key interests and issues raised by the local community included land access, potential air and noise impacts, agricultural land practices, and potential impacts to water resources. Stakeholders also expressed anticipation around the generation of business and employment opportunities.

RESPONSE TO SUBMISSIONS ON THE EIS

The Project Development Application and supporting EIS were placed on extended public exhibition from 23 September to 6 November 2015. During the exhibition period, the Department of Planning Environment (DP&E) received a total of 383 submissions from the community and other stakeholders.

In March 2016 KEPCO submitted a Response to Submissions report to provide additional information and / or clarification in relation to matters raised by the community and other stakeholders. In response to these submissions, KEPCO prepared a detailed Response to Submissions report, which was submitted to DP&E in March 2016.

Additional matters raised by a small number of stakeholders were addressed in a Supplementary Response to Submissions report submitted in August 2016.



PLANNING ASSESSMENT COMMISSION

In April 2017, the Project was referred to the NSW (New South Wales) Planning Assessment Commission (PAC) for further review

The PAC is an independent panel set up under section 23B of the NSW Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (EP&A Act) to review and determine major developments and provide expert advice on planning and development matters. The panel is made up of experts in planning, architecture, the environment, urban design, land economics, traffic and transport, law, engineering, tourism, heritage or government and public administration.

As part of the review and consideration process, the PAC held a public hearing of submissions from residents, the local community and other stakeholders on the Bylong Coal Project. Information on submissions and presentations from the hearing are available at

After the public hearing, the PAC will provide a report and recommendations on its findings to the Minister for Planning, which will be considered by the DP&E.

Current practice is that DP&E then updates their assessment report and the Project is then delegated back to the PAC as the delegate of the NSW Minister for Planning for a final determination (this may or may not include a public meeting).

If the DA is approved by the NSW Government, it will also require Australian Government approval as a 'controlled action' under the *Environment Protection and Bio diversity Conservation Act 1999*.

ONGOING CONSULTATION

Engagement with the community and key stakeholders will continue throughout the approvals process and beyond into the construction and operation phase of the Project. Various engagement mechanisms will continue to be implemented to ensure effective and ongoing engagement with project stakeholders, including:

- Face-to-face engagement with landholders and near neighbours through the Community Liaison Officers and other senior project staff
- Provision of regular project updates and documentation on the KEPCO website
- Project newsletters and fact sheets
- Community information sessions
- State and local government briefings and meetings
